ABOUT BRIGHTON OVAL

Located on Brighton Road, between Stopford Road and Highett Avenue, Brighton Oval is a major metropolitan sporting complex. Brighton Oval has strong linkages to the sports fields of Brighton Primary School (immediately opposite the complex).

The complex is the home ground to a number of sport and recreation groups including Brighton Rugby Club, Brighton Sport and Social Club, Brighton Football Club, Brighton Cricket Club, Brighton Lacrosse Club, Brighton Croquet Club and the Holdfast Bay Dog Owners Association.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In 2012 Council endorsed the Master Plan that was developed for the Brighton Oval Complex after extensive community consultation. This plan was based around the sporting hub model of one main building that the clubs would share along with community space and amenities throughout the site. Since this endorsement the clubs have identified that this plan will no longer be a viable option for them.

Over the past 12 months, Council has been working with the clubs to develop a mutually agreed concept for the Brighton Oval Complex.

The main difference between this new plan and the previous concept is that each club will retain a clubroom facility of their own. The original concept plan developed by Council, amalgamated three clubs (Brighton Ruby Union Football Club, Brighton Cricket Club, Brighton District and Old Scholars Football Club) into one building. All clubs have displayed the need for their own separate facilities due to a number of clubs being winter sports, growing membership numbers, taking on extra activities on the site and clubs wanting to include women's codes in their relevant sport.



THE PROPOSAL

The new Master Plan aims to provide a coordinated and strategic planning approach to the provision and development of community, sport and recreation infrastructure at the site.

The main features of the draft Master Plan are shown on the map below.

- Separate two storey facility for each club with integrated community spaces within each building. This includes public toilets
- New Community play spaces
- Warm up area (multi-purpose green space)
- Public amenities including BBQs, shelters, seating and toilets
- Fitness stations
- Relocated cricket nets
- Increased formalised car parking (285 spaces, increase of 155)
- New scoreboards
- New lighting
- Raised paved zone as a traffic calming approach to Highet Ave
- Youth area resurfaced and formalised half-court basketball area

The proposed new buildings will be designed to be multi use and will be able to be used by community groups when not in use by the clubs.

The new plan has been costed at approximately \$15.5 million. The project is dependent on Council securing external funding from the State and/or Federal Government and will be staged over a number of years.
